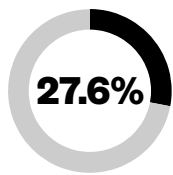

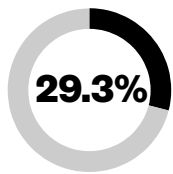

... Hispanic American share of the overall population, 2010

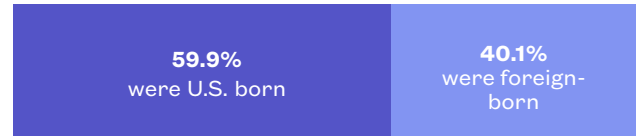
By 2019, the Hispanic population had increased by **25.4%** to reach a total of more than

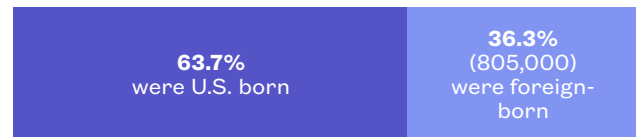


... Hispanic American share of the overall population, 2019

Of the Hispanic Americans in the Dallas-Fort Worth metro area in 2019...



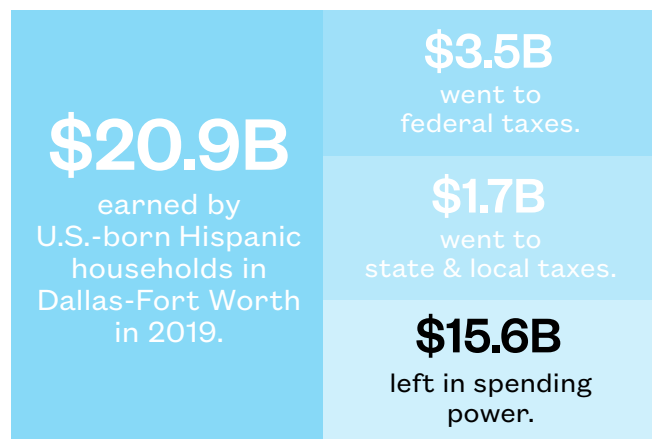
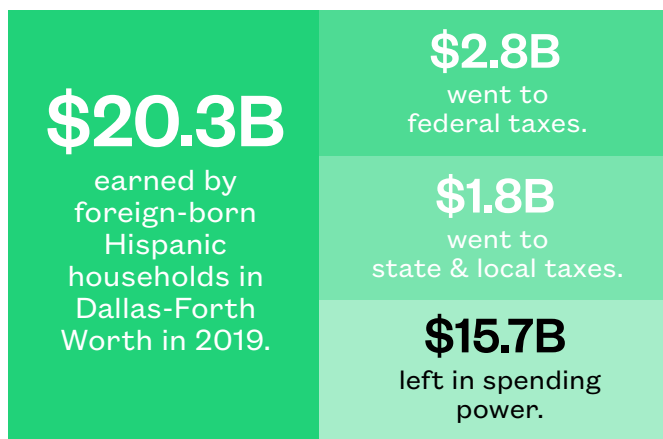
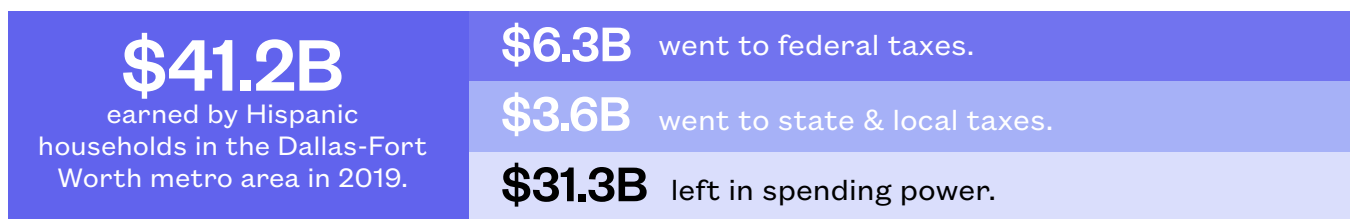

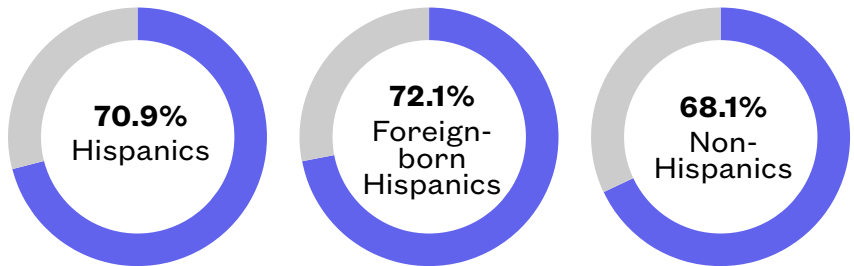

In 2019, there were more than

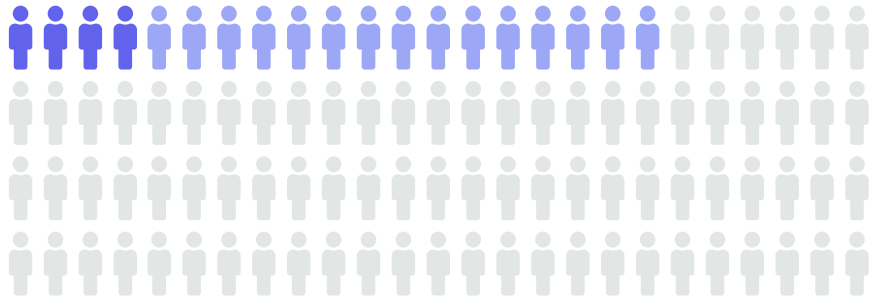
888,000

eligible Hispanic voters in the Dallas-Fort Worth metro area, including more than

191,000

Hispanic naturalized citizens.

Overall, the Hispanic population made up **18.8%** of the electorate in the metro area, including Hispanic naturalized citizens who on their own made up **4.1%**.
